GAS DRILLING ORDINANCE COUNCIL AGENDA BACKGROUND

When the Council meets on Tuesday night, one of the items on the agenda will be the first and final reading a resolution adopting a new chapter "Gas Drilling and Production" to be added to the Code of Ordinances. The Council Agenda Background lists eight items that were changed since the October 9, 2007 meeting:

- ◆ "Page 17 - Set the distance from a storage tank to the property line or a right-of-way at 75 feet
- ◆ "Page 32 - Set the distance a gas well from a fresh water well at 250 feet
- ◆ "Page 32 - Set the area for pre and post drilling testing of fresh water wells at 500 feet from a gas well
- ◆ "Page 38 - Set the distance from a gas well to the outer boundary of the drilling site (property line) to 75 feet
- ◆ "Page 38 - Set the distance from a

gas well to a storage tank or other source of ignition to 75 feet

- ◆ "Page 38 - Set the distance from a gas well to a public street, road, highway or future street, right-of-way or property line to 75 feet
- ◆ "Page 38 - Set the distance from a gas well to any building accessory to, but not necessary to the drilling operation at 100 feet
- ◆ "Page 38 - Set the distance a gas well from a fresh water well at 250 feet."

The Background document also lists four setbacks that must still be determined:

- ◆ "Page 33 - Distance from a vent flame or burning gases to any building
- ◆ "Page 36 - Distance from a storage tank to a residence or place of public assembly
- ◆ "Page 37 - Distance from a waste disposal tank to a residence or place of public assembly
- ◆ "Page 38 - Distance from a gas well to a residence or place of public assembly"

The following page contains a table prepared by the City that compares the setbacks used by nine neighboring cities.

NOV. 19 ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

At their meeting last week, the Zoning Board of Adjustment approved unanimously the request of Ronald and Debra Dickens (Variance Case V-052) for a variance from Section 5.1.A Height and Area Schedule for rear yard depth and minimum area of lot requirements for their property at 99 Regents Park St.

When the Texas Department of Transportation, through eminent domain, acquired property near their home for the widening of State Highway 121, the couple was left with virtually no backyard and a nonconformity with the zoning requirements for the R-7500, single residential detached district. The approved variance will allow them to retain the property as is, despite its noncompliance with the general standards set by City code.
